ELECTION OF 3 VICE PRESIDENTS

Standing Order 3.4 states that: *“The three Vice-Presidents, who shall each be Fellows, will serve for three years. There will be one Vice-President elected by each representative class of Forensic and Legal Medicine, which are forensic medicine, medically qualified coroners and medico-legal advisers. They shall be elected by ballot of all Members and Fellows of the electorate they represent (not including Honorary Fellows) ...”*

Standing Order 3.4.1 states that: *“Nominations must be made in writing on a Faculty nomination form only and nominees must be from the electorate for which they are nominated. Each candidate shall be proposed by a Fellow or Member from the relevant electorate, seconded likewise and must confirm in writing a willingness to serve if elected. Nominations must be received by the returning officer not less than three calendar months before the Annual General Meeting. Any nomination which reaches the returning officer outside the stipulated period shall be null and void.”*

3.4.4 states that *“No Vice-President is eligible for immediate re-election as Vice-President at the end of their term of office.”*

Therefore Fellows and Members are invited to submit nominations, for the following Faculty Offices:

Vice President (Forensic Medicine)
Vice President (Medically-Qualified Coroners)
Vice President (Medico-Legal Advisers)


- *Vice-Presidents will serve for three years (from the AGM in May 2010 to the AGM in May 2013 inclusive).*
- *You must be working in the same particular specialty to nominate a candidate for Vice President. The candidate must also be working in that specialty.*

A Fellow or Member must be nominated and seconded for his or her name to appear on the ballot paper, and the agreement of the nominee must have been obtained. The signatures of Fellows and Members supporting any nomination can be collected together on one proposal form, or separately on individual forms.

SUCH PROPOSALS MUST BE RECEIVED BY THE RETURNING OFFICER ON OR BEFORE 12.00 NOON ON FRIDAY 5TH FEBRUARY 2010

ANY NOMINATION WHICH REACHES THE RETURNING OFFICER OUTSIDE THE STIPULATED PERIOD SHALL BE NULL AND VOID

When circulated, the ballot paper will be designed to enable a transferable voting procedure. Candidates will also be invited to supply a photograph and statement to accompany the ballot paper.
