

Prof Margaret M Stark



Consultant Forensic Physician

Margaret Stark has been a forensic physician since 1989, a specialist in forensic & legal medicine, mainly working with the Metropolitan Police Service (MPS), also in Surrey, Sussex, and with British Transport Police. She was the first Medical Director of the Forensic Healthcare Service in London and the Director of the Clinical Forensic Medicine Unit for NSW Police, based in Sydney, from 2011 – 2014. Previously she was a principal in general practice and also worked in family planning.

She is a Past-President of the Faculty of Forensic & Legal Medicine (FFLM), Chair of the Forensic Science Sub-Committee, and Lead Facilitator for the Faculty's course in General Forensic Medicine. She was the Founding Academic Dean for the FFLM. She was awarded the David Jenkins Professorship in Forensic and Legal Medicine in 2011/12 and was an Adjunct Professor at Sydney University from 2012-2015. She is an Honorary Visiting Professor at Teesside University. She also works as the Responsible Officer and Appraisal Lead for Care & Custody (Health) Ltd (part of the MITIE Group), a Deputy Crematorium Referee (Croydon), an Expert Witness and a script reviewer for the BBC.

Challenges Faced in the Documentation & Interpretation of Injuries for Criminal Cases

It is essential that injuries are properly documented in cases where there may be criminal proceedings. Any clinician involved should be able to assess a patient, taking a detailed history and accurately documenting and interpreting any visible injuries, wounds, and scars that have been sustained as the result of an alleged assault. This can be difficult practically and takes time. It is important to be able to explain findings to other clinicians and members of the multi-professional team involved in safeguarding, as well as relatives.

Dr Jessica Ong

Named GP for Safeguarding Children in Lewisham and Clinical Care & Professional Lead for Learning Disability & Autism, South East London ICB

Thank you for this wonderful opportunity to speak on the topic of neurodiversity, a topic which is close to my heart as a mother to two wonderful neurodivergent children and an AuADHD clinician myself.

I have a General Practice background, have been Named GP for Safeguarding in Lewisham since 2019. For the past three years, I have noticed that the vast majority of safeguarding cases had neurodiversity as a contributing factor in the individual or family's safeguarding risk profile.

Since 2022, I have been the Clinical Care & Professional Lead (CCPL) for the Learning disability & Autism program in South East London. My career aim is to help create a neuro-affirmative health, social care, and education system in which being neurodivergent is no longer a disability. To help create a system in which all individuals are supported to fulfil their potential.

Disproportionality of Neurodiversity in Safeguarding

Purpose: To raise awareness amongst clinicians and safeguarding professionals regarding the disproportionality of neurodivergent population within safeguarding. We will review safeguarding & neurodiversity data in South East London and use some case studies to explore the reasons why neurodivergent traits may increase vulnerability.

Care for Adults with Autism in the Custody Environment

Ben has worked in several different areas of policing over the last eighteen years, mostly as a detective in various roles encompassing volume crime, serious crime, acquisitive crime, counter terrorism, rape, domestic abuse and professional standards.

From 2021-2023, he was the Superintendent in charge of the Custody and Criminal Justice portfolio for Cambridgeshire Police which covers all custody provision as well as case file quality, investigation standards, victim and witness care and Out of Court Diversions. For the last five months, he has been the area commander for Peterborough and Fenland, looking after local policing for the northern half of Cambridgeshire.

Dr Elisabeth Alton



Named GP for Safeguarding Adults, Humber and North Yorkshire ICS, Clinical Lead Forensic Project

Elisabeth is a named GP for safeguarding adults working for Humber and North Yorkshire Health and Care Partnership. She has a Master's degree in Safeguarding Adults, Law, Policy and Procedure from Keele University. Along with Dr Joy Shacklock she co-produced the RCGP Adult Safeguarding Toolkit. Elisabeth sat on the Decision-making and mental capacity NICE guideline [NG108] committee and has worked extensively in implementing good practice around the MCA in primary care nationally. Currently she is involved in research into the interface of primary care and safeguarding in care homes in conjunction with the Department of Health and Social Care at Hull University.

Her interest in forensic examination of adults at risk of harm stems from being involved in safeguarding adult reviews where the victim had been injured and recognising the inequality of service between children and adults that currently exists. She is currently the clinical lead for a pilot project in the Humber region providing forensic medicals for adults at risk of harm.
