

FFLM Strategy for 2020/21

The FFLM has the following charitable objectives:

- To promote for the public benefit the advancement of education and knowledge in the field of forensic and legal medicine in all its classes;
- To develop and maintain for the public benefit the good practice of forensic and legal medicine by ensuring the highest professional standards of competence and ethical integrity.

The strategy for 2020/21 will ensure that:

Membership engagement

- Maintenance of weekly Bulletin
- Maintenance of monthly Presidential message
- Survey of members completed in January 2020 with results provided to members
- Virtual Annual General Meeting held in May 2020

Journal of Forensic & Legal Medicine (JFLM)

- Positive progress with regard to the Journal with an increase in article submission and increase in rejection rate (improved quality); increase in Impact Factor
- Consideration of selling JFLM Faculty Board decided against this

Website

- Development of new website with enhanced user functionality (easier for members to book for events/exams etc.)
- Review of materials on the website
- Introduction of IT efficiencies on the website to reduce repetitive tasks so allowing staff to work proactively and pursue new opportunities
- Improve access to publications and indexing via search engines to allow wider reach for our guidance

Quality standards and educational resources

- Educational documents Most important resource for members and the FFLM (Nationally and Internationally) as confirmed in the membership survey completed in January 2020 and feedback received (see page 6)
- Appointment of Assistant Academic Dean to assist the Academic Dean with regard to the educational resources and the rolling programme of review
- All educational documents now copyrighted
- Distribution list for educational documents checked and amended, regularly updated and added to, with a programme of circulation of the new educational documents after each Academic Committee
- Free webinar on updated educational documents by the authors scheduled for July 2020
- E-learning course (FFLM/Ulster University) reviewed and updated annually with work beginning on expansion to include General Forensic Medicine (GFM)
- Consideration of alternate ways to deliver training (rather than face-to-face) using different IT resources
- Rapid reaction to the challenges faced by our members following the COVID-19 pandemic with the development of a wide range of documents for GFM and Sexual Offence Medicine (SOM), regularly reviewed and updated
- Programme of webinars developed for the summer/autumn 2020
- Increase training initiatives outside of FFLM e.g. for HCPs involved in adult safeguarding in relation to documentation of injuries, statement writing, court room skills – ongoing
- Consolidation of relationship with Teesside University regarding the Course in GFM leading to the University Certificate in Postgraduate Professional Development (UCPPD) in General Forensic Medicine
- Assisted Teesside University with the application for Course Approval of the Post Graduate Certificate Advanced Forensic Practitioner (Custody or Sexual Offence) Higher Apprenticeship
- Development of a course for the assessment of individuals exposed to conducted energy devices (CED). Following requests from numerous providers to amend the FFLM standards we have liaised with the Home Office, Scientific Advisory Committee on the Medical Implications of Less-Lethal Weapons (SACMILL), National Police Chiefs' Council (NPCC), NHS England (NHSE) and other interested parties to develop a competency based approach for the required assessment protecting detainees, officers, and clinicians
- Detainees with substance use disorders in police custody: Guidelines for clinical management (aka the Blue Guidelines) has been published; this fifth edition was published in collaboration with RCPsych
- The development of the document 'Safe and Secure Handling and Supply of Medicines in Sexual Assault Services for Adults and Children' – produced in in partnership with the NHS E&I SARC Medicines Management Task and Finish Group
- Continued access to the RCP Library and Information Centre

Promotion of examinations

- Review of Regulations and Syllabus with an updated reading list so more user friendly completed May 2020
- Resources for Educational Supervisors and Clinical Validators completed May 2020



- Free webinar by the Chief Examiner on the updated examinations regulations and syllabus completed June 2020.
- Frequently asked Questions document for the FFLM Examination session 2020/21 completed June 2020
- Offer the Part 1 MFFLM and LFFLM and DLM examination overseas completed April 2020
- Offer DLM exam outside of core groups (legal advisors, paralegals, etc.) ongoing
- Membership examination for DLAs in progress

Our overwhelming objective in 2019/2020 was to reduce expenditure and we will continue to carefully monitor the FFLM finances:

- FFLM finances are under constant review following the fundamental changes required to reduce costs authorised by the Faculty Board in July 2019
- Freezing of staff pay and staff training budget
- Further reductions in costs will be made where possible, e.g. storage facilities
- Applications for charitable funding are being investigated by the Treasurer
