

In addition to working as a senior detective, Craig is also a Hostage & Crisis Negotiator Coordinator, and is actively involved in dynamic suicide intervention and managing the negotiator response to people in crisis.

Prof Margaret M Stark



Immediate Past President, FFLM

Margaret Stark is the Immediate Past President of the Faculty of Forensic and Legal Medicine (FFLM). She is Chair of the Forensic Science Sub-Committee, Lead Facilitator for the Faculty's course in General Forensic Medicine, and an educational advisor for the Faculty's examinations. She has been a forensic physician for nearly 33 years, currently working with the Metropolitan Police Service (MPS). She was the first Medical Director of the Forensic Healthcare Service in London and was also the Director of the Clinical Forensic Medicine Unit for NSW Police, based in Sydney, from 2011 – 2014.

She has a Master of Science in Medical Education from UCL, and a Master in Law from Cardiff. She was the Founding Academic Dean for the FFLM and was awarded the David Jenkins Professorship in Forensic and Legal Medicine 2011/12 and was an Adjunct Professor at Sydney University from 2012-2015. She is Editor of 'Clinical Forensic Medicine' A Physician's Guide, the fourth edition published in 2020. She an Visiting Professor of Teesside University.

Biologist by degree, experienced in care work in a former life both in educational settings and adult social care and now lawyer by profession. I joined the CPS in 2006 in Humberside and prosecuted in the magistrates court until I moved to Eastern CPS in 2018 and became District Crown Prosecutor for Cambridgeshire Magistrates Court. I was appointed as Assistant Coroner in Hull and East Riding in 2017 and have been involved with adult safeguarding and child deaths as part of that role.

Poor Care or Neglect?

A discussion about the role of the CPS in prosecuting cases where care has gone wrong concentrating on the care worker offences but touching upon familial assaults and also neglect in the coroner's court.

Named Doctor for Adult Safeguarding

Elisabeth started working as a general practitioner in 1989. She was a partner in a practice in Beverley from 1998 leaving recently to pursue her interest in adult safeguarding. Elisabeth became a named GP for safeguarding adults in 2014. Completing a Master's degree in Safeguarding adults and the law at Keele University created many opportunities. A particular interest in the MCA led to her sitting on the NICE Decision-making and Mental Capacity guideline committee [NG108], as well as representing primary care on the National Mental Capacity Forum senior leadership committee. Recently she has completed a piece of research regarding the interface of primary care, care homes and the difficulties of recognising and reporting abuse.

The challenge of recognising non-accidental injuries in safeguarding adults has led to a collaboration with the FFLM and NHSE&I to improve outcomes for adults at risk of harm. This work is on-going.

Putting the Jigsaw Together in Cases of Physical Abuse

Soon after qualifying as a GP, I worked for the US Army in Germany.

Returning to the UK after 6 years, I have been ½ time GP Principal in South Bucks from 1988 to 2017, then GP in ED until May 2019.

I am on the FFLM Research Subcommittee and an FFLM examiner.
