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Biographies of facilitators

Dr Elisabeth Alton MA MB BS MRCGP

Elisabeth is a named GP for safeguarding in N.Lincs and East Riding of Yorkshire CCG's. She has a particular interest in safeguarding adults. She has a Masters in Safeguarding Adults, Law Policy and Procedure from Keele University.

Along with Dr Joy Shacklock she co-produced the RCGP Adult Safeguarding Toolkit. Elisabeth sat on the NICE MCA Guidelines Committee and has worked extensively in implementing good practice around the MCA in CCG's nationally. Currently she is involved in research into safeguarding in care homes in conjunction with the Department of Health and Social Care at Hull University.

Her interest in forensic examination of adults who are at risk of harm stems from being involved in safeguarding adult reviews where the victim has been injured and realising the inequality of service between children and adults that currently exists.

Margaret Stark is a specialist in forensic & legal medicine and a Past-President of the Faculty of Forensic and Legal Medicine (FFLM). She is Chair of the FFLM's Forensic Science Sub-Committee and the Lead Facilitator for the Faculty's course in General Forensic Medicine. She has been a forensic physician for 34 years. She was the first Medical Director of the Forensic Healthcare Service in London and was also the Director of the Clinical Forensic Medicine Unit for NSW Police, based in Sydney, from 2011 – 2014.

She has a Master of Science in Medical Education from UCL, and a Master in Law from Cardiff and is a Fellow of the Higher Education Academy. She was the Founding Academic Dean for the FFLM and was awarded the David Jenkins Professorship in Forensic and Legal Medicine 2011/12 and was an Adjunct Professor at Sydney University from 2012-2015. She has written extensively in the field and is Editor of 'Clinical Forensic Medicine', the fourth edition published in January 2020. She has been involved in several qualitative and quantitative research projects on a range of topics including custodial care, forensic science, death certification, education and training, injuries and the use of force, substance misuse, and traffic medicine, including the UK Government research into cannabis and driving.

Dr Charlotte Wattebot O'Brien MA MBBS MRCPsych MRCP

Charlotte is an older adult liaison psychiatry consultant at the Royal London Hospital and Undergraduate Lead for Medical Education in Tower Hamlets.

She is an educational supervisor for higher trainees and an Honorary Senior Lecturer in the Centre for Psychiatry & Mental Health at Queen Mary University of London. She is an Associate Fellow of the Higher Education Academy. She recently led a project to co-produce information on Undergraduate Medical Education for Patients and Students. She is currently developing a course on Managing Clinical Uncertainty as part of the new Barts Professionalism Curriculum
